What We as Adventist Believe

Marriage was divinely established in Eden and affirmed by Jesus to be a lifelong union between a man and a woman in loving companionship. For the Christian a marriage commitment is to God as well as to the spouse, and should be entered into only between partners who share a common faith. Mutual love, honor, respect, and responsibility are the fabric of this relationship, which is to reflect the love, sanctity, closeness, and permanence of the relationship between Christ and His church. Regarding divorce, Jesus taught that the person who divorces a spouse, except for fornication, and marries another, commits adultery. Although some family relationships may fall short of the ideal, marriage partners who fully ommit themselves to each other in Christ may achieve loving unity through the guidance of Spirit and the nurture of the church...

What We as Adventist Believe

God blesses the family and intends that its members shall assist each other toward complete maturity. Parents are to bring up their children to love and obey the Lord. By their example and their words they are to teach them that Christ is a loving disciplinarian, ever tender and caring, who wants them to become members of His bødy, the family of God. Increasing family closeness is one of the earmarks of the final gospel message. (Gen. 2:18-25; Matt. 19:3-9; John 2:1-11; 2 Cor./6:14; Eph. 5:21-33; Matt. 5:31, 32; Mark 10:11, 12; Luke 16:18; 1 Cor. 7:10, Ex. 20:12; Eph. 6:1-4; Deut. 6:5-9; Prov. 22:6; Mal. 4:5, 6.)

The First Wedding

[18] And the LORD God said, [It is] not good that the man should be alone; I will make him an help meet for him. [19] And out of the ground the LORD God formed every beast of the field, and every fowl of the air; and brought [them] unto Adam to see what he would call them: and whatsoever Adam called every living creature, that [was] the name thereof. [20] And Adam gave names to all cattle, and to the fowl of the air, and to every beast of the field; but for Adam there was not found an help meet for him. [21] And the LORD God caused a deep sleep to fall upon Adam, and he slept: and he took one of his ribs, and closed up the flesh instead thereof; [22] And the rib, which the LORD God had taken from man, made he a woman, and brought her unto the man. 
Twin Institutions

He referred them to the blessed days of Eden when God pronounced all things "very good." Then marriage and the Sabbath had their origin, twin institutions for the glory of God in the benefit of humanity. Then, as the Creator joined the hands of the holy pair in wedlock, saying, A man shall "leave his father and his mother, and shall cleave unto his wife: and they shall be one," He enunciated the law of marriage for all the children of Adam to the close of time. THE 'TWIN' INSTITUTIONS

Marriage was from the creation constituted by God a divine ordinance. The marriage institution was made in Eden. The Sabbath of the fourth commandment was instituted in Eden, when the foundations of the world were laid, when the morning stars sang together, and all the sons of God shouted for joy. God's Purpose For Husband and Wife

God made from the man a woman, to be a companion and helpmeet for him, to be one with him, to cheer, encourage, and bless him, he in his turn to be her strong helper. All who enter into matrimonial relations with a holy purpose--the husband to obtain the pure affections of a woman's heart, the wife to soften and improve her husband's character and give it completeness--fulfill God's purpose for them.

Christ came not to destroy this institution, but to restore it to its original sanctity and elevation. He came to restore the moral image of God in man, and He began His work by sanctioning the marriage relation. {Adventist Home p.99.1,2 EG White}



God's Purpose For Husband and Wife

He who gave Eve to Adam as a helpmeet performed His first miracle at a marriage festival. In the festal hall where friends and kindred rejoiced together, Christ began His public ministry. Thus He sanctioned marriage, recognizing it as an institution that He Himself had established. He ordained that men and women should be united in holy wedlock, to rear families whose members, crowned with honor, should be recognized as members of the family above. {Adventist Home p.99.3 EG White}

A Joyous Occasion

The Scriptures state that both Jesus and His disciples were called to this marriage feast [at Cana]. Christ has given Christians no sanction to say when invited to a marriage, We ought not to be present on so joyous an occasion. By attending this feast Christ taught that He would have us rejoice with those who do rejoice in the observance of His statutes. He never discouraged the innocent festivities of mankind when carried on in accordance with the laws of Heaven. A gathering that Christ honored by His presence, it is right that His followers should attend. After attending this feast, Christ attended many others, sanctifying them by His presence and instruction. {AH 100.4}

Inappropriate at Weddings

Display, Extravagance, and Hilarity Are Inappropriate At Weddings.--Marriage ceremonies are made matters of display, extravagance, and self-indulgence. But if the contracting parties are agreed in religious belief and practice, and everything is consistent, and the ceremony be donducted without display and extravagance, marriage at this time need not be displeasing to God. {Adventist Home p.100.5 EG White}

Inappropriate at Weddings

There is no reason why we should make great parade or display, even if the parties were perfectly suited to each other. It has always seemed so very inappropriate to me to see the marriage ordinance associated with hilarity and glee and a pretense of something. No. It is an ordinance ordained of God, to be looked upon with the greatest solemnity. As the family relation is formed here below, it is to give a demonstration of what they shall be, the family in heaven above. The Blending of Two Lives

This is an important period in the history of the ones who have stood before you to unite their interests, their sympathies, their love, their labor, with each other in the ministry of the saving of souls. In the marriage relation there is a very important step taken--the blending of two lives into one. . . . A Pledge Before Heavenly Witnesses

God has ordained that there should be perfect love and harmony between those who enter into the marriage relation. Let bride and bridegroom, in the presence of the heavenly universe, pledge themselves to love each other as God has ordained they should. . . . The wife is to respect and reverence her husband, and the husband is to love and cherish his wife.

Sacred Circle


There is a sacred circle around every family which should be preserved. No other one has any right in that sacred circle. The husband and wife should be all to each other. The wife should have no secrets to keep from her husband and let others know, and the husband should have no secrets to keep from his wife to relate to others. The heart of his wife should be the grave for the faults of the husband, and the heart of the husband the grave for his wife's faults. Never should either party indulge in a joke at the expense of the other's feelings. Never should either the husband or wife in sport or in any other manner complain of each other to others, for frequently indulging in this foolish and what may seem perfectly harmless joking will end in trial with each other and perhaps estrangement. I have been shown that there should be a sacred shield around every family. {Adventist Home p.177.1 EG White}



Sacred Circle

The home circle should be regarded as a sacred place, a symbol of heaven, a mirror in which to reflect ourselves. Friends and acquaintances we may have, but in the home life they are not to meddle. CONTRACT OR COVENTANT

With a contract, if one agreeing party does something in violation of the contract then it is considered broken. The whole contract becomes null and void. Basically the signers of a contract agree to hold up their ends as long as the other signatories hold up theirs too.

With a covenant, both parties agree to hold up their ends regardless of whether the other party keeps their part of the agreement. A violation of a covenant by one party doesn't matter as far as the other party's responsibility to continue to do what they agreed to do.



Characteristics of a Contract

There are four general characteristics of contracts:

- 1. Contracts are often made for a limited period of time.
- 2. Contracts often deal with specific actions.
- 3. Contracts are based on an "If..., then...," mentality.
- 4. Contracts are motivated by the desire to get something.



Characteristics of a Covenant

Covenant Characteristics

- 1. Covenants are initiated for the benefit of the other person.
- 2. In covenant relationships people make unconditional promises.
- 3. Covenant relationships are based on steadfast love.
- 4. Covenant relationships view commitments as permanent.
- 5. Covenant relationships require confrontation and forgiveness.

EZEKIEL 16: 1-8

- [1] Again the word of the LORD came unto me, saying,
- [2] Son of man, cause Jerusalem to know her abominations,

- 1. Vs1-2: God speaks to Ezekiel about Jerusalem
- 2. Vs 3-6: I have loved and cared for Jerusalem from her birth
- 3. Vs 7: How she grew and Gods interest in her for marriage
 - a. God caused her to survive, so she grew into a beautiful lady
 - b. God says her breast were well formed and she matured
 - c/Her hair (pubic hair) had grown. This is hair that grows when:
 - i. When a lady matures
 - ii. When her breasts are being formed
 - iii. Only seen when uncovered/naked


EZEKIEL 16: 1-8

 - a. Her time was the time of love; she was fully ripe for marital intimacy
 - b. Marriage consummation (sex) carefully veiled by well chosen phrases
 - i. Making a marriage covenant with the woman
 - ji. The Lord says "You became mine"
 - iii. The Lord covering the nakedness of the woman with His clothing
 - "Signifying the intent to confer upon the maiden the honor of marriage" (Bible Commentary Vol 4, p. 627)
